Schedules 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 12, 13, 14, 18, 24, 25, 27, and 30 are partly filled, the others being blank. The Bureau of Ethnology alphabet is used. Obtained from the chief, "Evans' Bill" or M^un-ki^u-ye-au (the best authority), Hugh (who speaks little English), "Rogue River John", a half Tak^uél^uma, and John Punzie, who has forgotten most of his language.
