 their offerings, & prayed the rock.

When chds. passed they always deposited
 salmon, comas, etc., on top of that rock

(but the rock was med. rock's own pipe, which
 he sometimes lent to a ~~good~~ chd. doctor to smoke, & he wd.

bucket to make doctor's heart boil, —

die later.

Med. rock wd boil a bad doctor's heart
 (a bad doc. who had poisoned good children of a family)
 to punish bad doctor, ~~was~~ in the bucket & stored it with the
 paddle, & use the "paddle" for picking up hot rocks to put into the
 Soem Poes, Frances' mother's bro's son,
 told Frances that med. rock had offered him a pipe
 to smoke - and in 5 yrs. he died

Francis says the name 'altawayakhwa' came from a story when he danced with that ind. doctor. His name was 'altawayakhwa' & his younger brother. She has never seen this mt. in Illinois River, & n. of it was a grove on it.

'altawayakhwa' a mt. long bellings
It has no trees on it except a single bunch of trees on top of it — that bunch of trees are his feathers. The taltaniya³ camped there. It is the side of Grants Pass River (tip. Pt's 'ilta, Grants Pass River).

Rhy. ~~is~~ altawayakhwa
is the big mt. Grants Pass, w. of katpalta, the med. rock is the lower side of rd.
tanmukula. This is the name of med. rock. The ridge.

Rhy. ~~is~~ ind. doctors wd. kill white families.
tanmukukii (= med. rock) (after it sat down there I was called tanmukukletha' = the Smith ranch or flat, where med. rock is. When 'altawayakhwa' heard the news that tanmukukii had killed an Indian doctor, he was + pulled one arm off ind. doctor & danced with the arm, then he tied up his hair (now the grove of trees on top the mt. Sexton Mt.) & became Sexton Mt.)

Med Evans' mother was named sintawayakhwa, she married a Shasta ind., & that is why Med Evans talks both Shasta + Tak. They called her sintawayakhwa because her place, her home, her land, was 'altawayakhwa', Sexton Mt.

gathering camp — but repeats it as o.k.

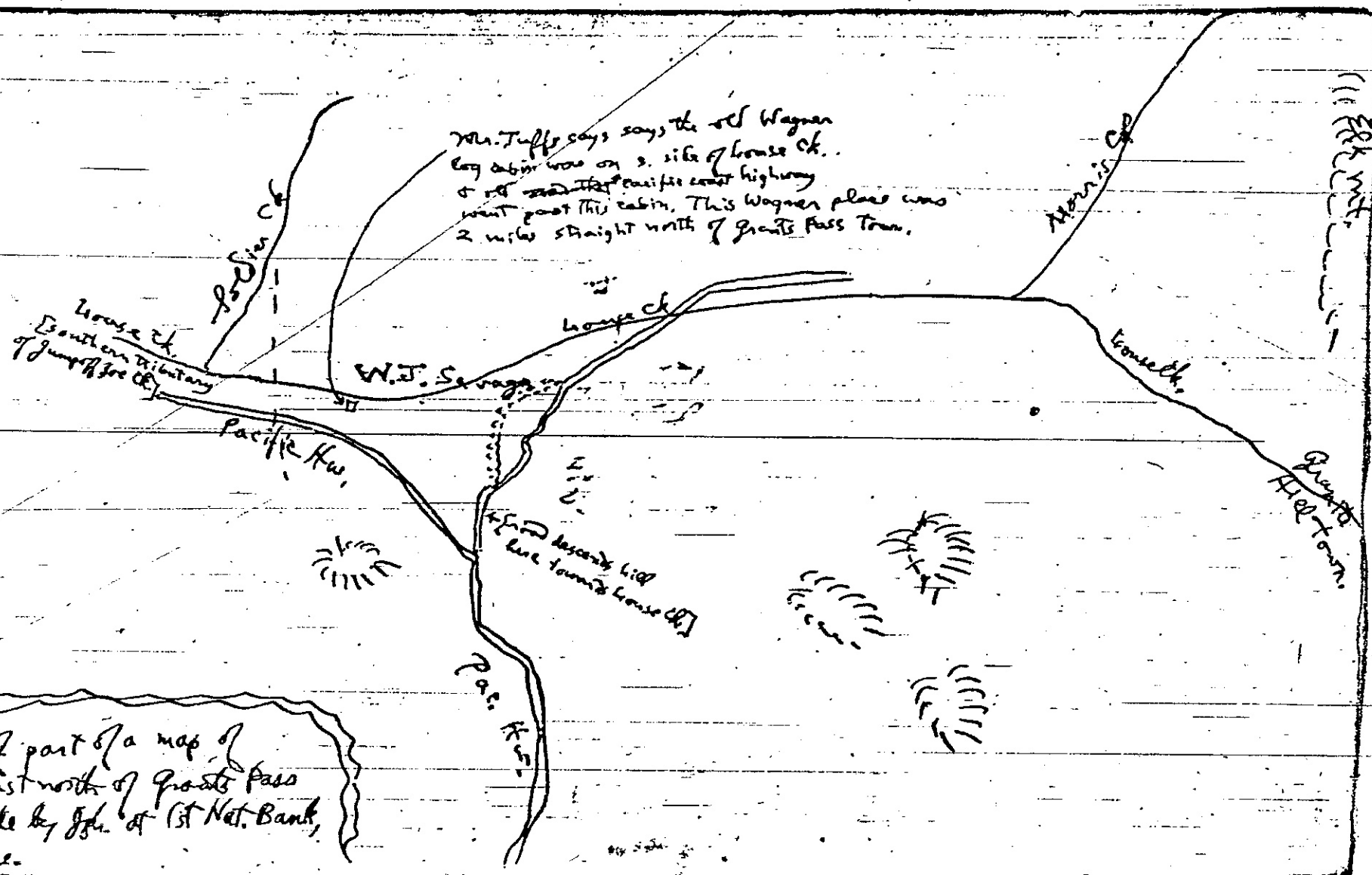
Takalaksi, a little hill immediately
to the
adjacent to xat'oukh, the Table
Rock Indians, tired of fighting at Table
Rock vicinity, came and lived at
takalaksi. Mpt. & perfectly understood.
xat'oukh is a field &
takalaksi is a hill beside the flat.

Mr. J. F. Tuffs, pres. of 1st
Nat. Bank at Grants Pass, says the
Duck Ranch was on the present
Pacific hwy., not on the old hwy.,
and that the old hwy. splits
from the new hwy. n. of Jump Off
Joe Cr. while the Pleasant Valley
Cemetery is on the S. side of
Jump Off Joe Cr.

Mr. J. T. Tuffe, near of the
Grant's Pass (St. Not bank), says it
is true that there is a fall
in Grave Ck. somewhat
upstream of Grave Ck's mouth,
& there is another big fall
in the Rogue River, downstream
of mouth of Grave Ck. This
latter fall, the great fall
in Rogue River, is called
Raney (phon. rye mi) Falls
(at first remembered it as
Raney, (raining) falls, & then
remembered it as Raney Falls.

Camp Two.

Tsooytanak

Says that soytanak is
Butte Co., knows the equivalence,
etc. when soytanak is a mt at
head of Butte Co., she agrees, she
~~was~~ looked at the soytanak from
mts. w. of Jacksonville, & her cousin
W. L. her ~~last~~ soytanak was her
father's ~~mother's~~ place. Rogue River Jennie
my cousin, lived long in Jacksonville
& returned from W. Tennessee long ago &
stayed in Jacksonville - you see that
the ~~rock~~ little hill - that's your
fetter's place, they sat down &
looked this way, Pitt with his long
little flock mt ~~stood~~ stand
here = soytanak, Frank Buford
was 12 yrs old & got to
working there at soytanak soon
& he told in when he came to
her house at Grand Round that
there is a saw mill here. His father
was a white man. The cave was
a foot of soyt.

at rock house

Two dudes as guides
 2 white fellows & ~~one~~ white man
 were at Tony house to hunt
 gold & somebody threw a rock
 & scared them & they ran.
 one dude & I asked if there was
 - he did not want whites to hunt
 gold there. These white men were
 camping at Table Rock. Some took clubs,
 to Mary Engen's place to hunt
 gold & other dudes took clubs. To Everett
 city to hunt gold. This is the
 same time they whites saw dudes
 had found some gold at Rocky Point.
 A white man came in. Lets go back to
 Table Rock. A stone slid itself
 the dudes prayed & talked to the
 mt. & the mt. slides stopped & it
 started to rain. It used to be
 awful bad for strangers to go there
 if one goes there & eats or
 drinks, he swells up & his
 belly bursts.

Soigtanah we shd remember that
Frank Buford (by. fr.), Molly's cousin
at Yreka, worked at just one
sawmill for years, that that sawmill
was at Soigtanah and that there
was no town at that sawmill, only
one house there, ~~the~~ in which the
owner of the sawmill lived. ~~the~~
Frank Buford wd know where the
place is. Jennie showed Molly
Soigtanah mt. from top of
the mts. west of Jacksonville. It
was a little black-looking mt.
to the left of Mt. Pitt.
Soigtanah cave is at foot of
a little mt. behind which a higher
mt. rises. All rd. in exactly
these words. the mt. is to
left of Mt. Pitt when seen from
Jacksonville mts.

Mr. Marshall says to see

The sons of Tuffon who ran the
Tuffon mill on F. G. Ck. are living
above Butte Falls.

I talked with a man who is neighbor
of Mr. McAllister. He says there are ~~are~~ caves
all around the base of Robertson Butte,
lava caves, but they are 6 miles
up creek of McAllister's sawmill. There
are no caves near them this side of the old
sawmill.

There were a number of sawmills
around Butte Falls, in B. Falls region,
& a smaller number around Eagle Pt.

There are many ~~are~~ caves in a mt. due
n. of Mt. Pitt, & many caves in the base of
Mt. Pitt.

The mts. e. of ~~the~~ Medford all
run together ~~from a~~ when seen from a
distance, just as the mts. w. of Jackson-
ville do.

from the top of this ~~peak~~ same ridge, prob.
no one has ever been in it, ~~probably~~
~~considered~~ at 300 ft. east of the
standing rocks, you cannot see it
unless you go on the east side. There
are all colored rocks on the big bluff that
the cave is in, in a cliff 800 ft.
high. Mt. T. is a very sharp peak.
No if ed. see Mt. T. from Jacksonville,
possibly ed from Jr. hilltop. No sawnths
near.

There are several little buttes in the
Eagle Point region, n. & e. of Eagle ~~Point~~ Pt.
There is Round top, sw. of Butte Falls; Joe Dyer
Butte, 10 miles e. n.w. of Butte Falls; Crow
Foot Mts. (called this

Mr. Poole: There are caves all along
on each side of Butte Cr. at Rocky Hill,
+ a good sized cave on the slope of
Rocky Hill upslope of Ira Tuggate's
homestead flats, ^{near that top of the hill.} Also some caves on
the s. side of the top of Rocky Hill, ~~east~~
& the old old road went around the
northern edge of Rocky Hill. The creek
runs east & west at Ira Tuggate's place.

What makes Dudley Mt. the mt.,
Dudley mt. is seen plainly from near
Jacksonville, and Foster Buttes, though
higher, have only their tops visible
from Jacksonville for the Foster Buttes are ~~the~~
hidden by Dudley mt. ^{when viewed from Jacksonville.}
It is a steep walled canyon.

Get into Ira Tuggate's flat via the
Friedenburger road from which turns off
betw. Cogley's and the old sawmill,
or on an old road taking old road in a
downcreek direction (cannot get to

The cave is 50 or

60 ft from the creek. It is 250 ft. down creek from the bridge. You climb up it is 20 feet upslope of the truck road, it is 200 ft. down creek from the powder house. It is at a rocky point. We have to crawl to get in, but you can stand up after you get inside. It slopes down ward away from the creek. Holst & Poole know of 40 caves at Rossler peak. The log road is a narrow standing rocks.

Elevation of Ruster Buttes is 6205.

Elev. of Dudley Mt. is quite a bit lower.

Elev. of Mt. McLaughlin is 9760. Dudley Mt. is a timbered dark looking mt., all timbered, the Ruster Buttes are mostly brush on the west side ~~the~~ on only the north side of Ruster B. has much timber.

There are caves on ~~the~~ Rocky Hill. Rocky Hill is on the S. edge of Butte Ck. Reservoir just where these caves are on the hill. The old old road went down the north slope of Rocky Hill. Rocky Hill is the only long grade before Dudley Mt. It is on the n. side of Butte Ck. & the Rocky Hill is on the S. side of Rock Ck. The very top of Ruster is Gold. Dudley wd do for a lookout but you wd have to cut quite a lot of timber. Ruster is the best lookout in the country.

M. Walter Marshall, $1\frac{1}{2}$ s.
of Brownsboro store. thinks so. ytanakh
is the Triffin sawmill, on Four Bit
Creek. Get Crater Lake Nat. Forest

Langrey sawmill is very old, at
the oldest sawmill in the country is
a little water-power mill at 4-bit ck.
But no cut there.

Marshall boys have hunted all over
Round Top mt. & no cave here. Only thing
they ever noticed was a petrified tree.

At Mr. John Nichols' ranch,
4 m. up Lake Ck. from Lake
Creek store, is a cave and
waterfall. You drive from Lake
Ck. up Little Butte Ck. a short
distance and pass under a
flume, and then turn to the
right going up Lake Ck. When
you come to a lake you
turn to the right and come
to John Nichols' ranch,
a two-story yellow house. The
cave is $\frac{1}{4}$ m. up a gulch from
John Nichols' house. It is a large
cave and a waterfall. When I ask
about standing rocks, says there
are none there. This is the only
cave anywhere near Lake Creek store.

Mr. H. H. Fox, 2 m. up
South Fork of Little Butte Cr.
from Lake Creek store. He has
plowed up a stone dripping
pan.

Mr. Holt thought the flour mill was
at the falls, or just below, to use
the power of the falls, but Molly
says the flour mill was just above
the falls. It is true that a big
ridge comes in on the n. side of
R. River at Good Hill town, & the
flour mill sits at the very foot
of this ridge on the e. side.
That ridge runs way back to
the head of Sam's Cr. & the
beacon light sits on top of the
ridge - not on the very top of
the mt. which is n. of the beaken
light, but on top of the ridge.
Good Hill town is about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile
n. of the flour mill & R.P.T. is
 $2\frac{1}{2}$ m. n. of flour mill. The name of
flour mill. Map calls it lower
& upper Table Rock.
^{upper R. Riv.}
Jackson Ford is just below where
the Dodge Bridge is now. Carry Riffles are
just below Jackson Ford. This are falls at foot
at lower end of Carry Riffles.

Mr. Holst: The falls were only $\frac{1}{2}$ mile above the Gold Hill hwy bridge & railroad bridge. There is quite a gorge just below the falls. N. name of these falls. The falls are less than $\frac{1}{4}$ mile up of the flour mill; the flour mill was on N. edge of Rogue River; the old flour mill has been torn down. ~~at~~ The flour mill was 300 yards downriver of the Gold Hill town waterworks, and the present Gold Hill city waterworks are on the site of the old waterfalls. Rock Point is where the hwy bridge is on of Gold Hill. That is then called the Rock ~~Gold Hill~~ Rock Pt. bridge. The older bridge, ~~was~~ ~~was~~ piers still stand just upriver of present R.P. bridge.

Mr. Holst has an abstract which mentions a toll road from that was built in early days from Rock Pt. along the N. side of R. Riv., thru the present town of G. Hill, & running up Lantz Cr. & back betw. the 2 Table rocks & crossing R. River at the old Bibber bridge, & thence to Jacksonville. Holst understood that Bibber bridge was toll bridge but never knew the other bridge was toll bridge. This toll road was then a 40 ft. road & was later widened in 1929 ca. to an 80 ft. rd.

At Ashland says tooy tanakh is not one
of the Ashland range of mts. at all, but a
mt. e. of Table Rock
(interv. at S. P. 27)

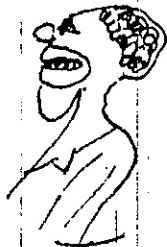

Molly: there used to be a rock
in Rogue River, just its top was sticking
out of the water, it was in deep water,
no place for it, in front of Table Rock,
& some kind of a black animal used to
come at times & sit on it, maybe it was an otter.
~~then~~ and now this rock has shifted, &
is on the s. edge of Rogue River. all the
porcupine animals that used to live in this
country, all went back in (= retired) when
the whites came.

This rock is in front of the
middle of Table Rock.

Drolly: Somewhere east of
Table Rock, possibly where we ate
lunch yesterday (at Lake Creek town),
a lot of 10-14 Tanakh Indians were
walking along ^{they were short & stunted men,} and Coyote met them &
said "pa...", and all turned to rock,
one of these men was packing a deer
on his back, & petrified thus.
This place is somewhere on the 5th
trail that ran east, (to All. Lakes)
from Table Rock.
