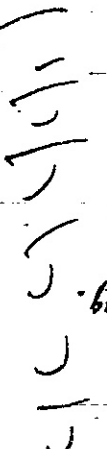

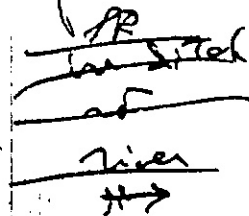

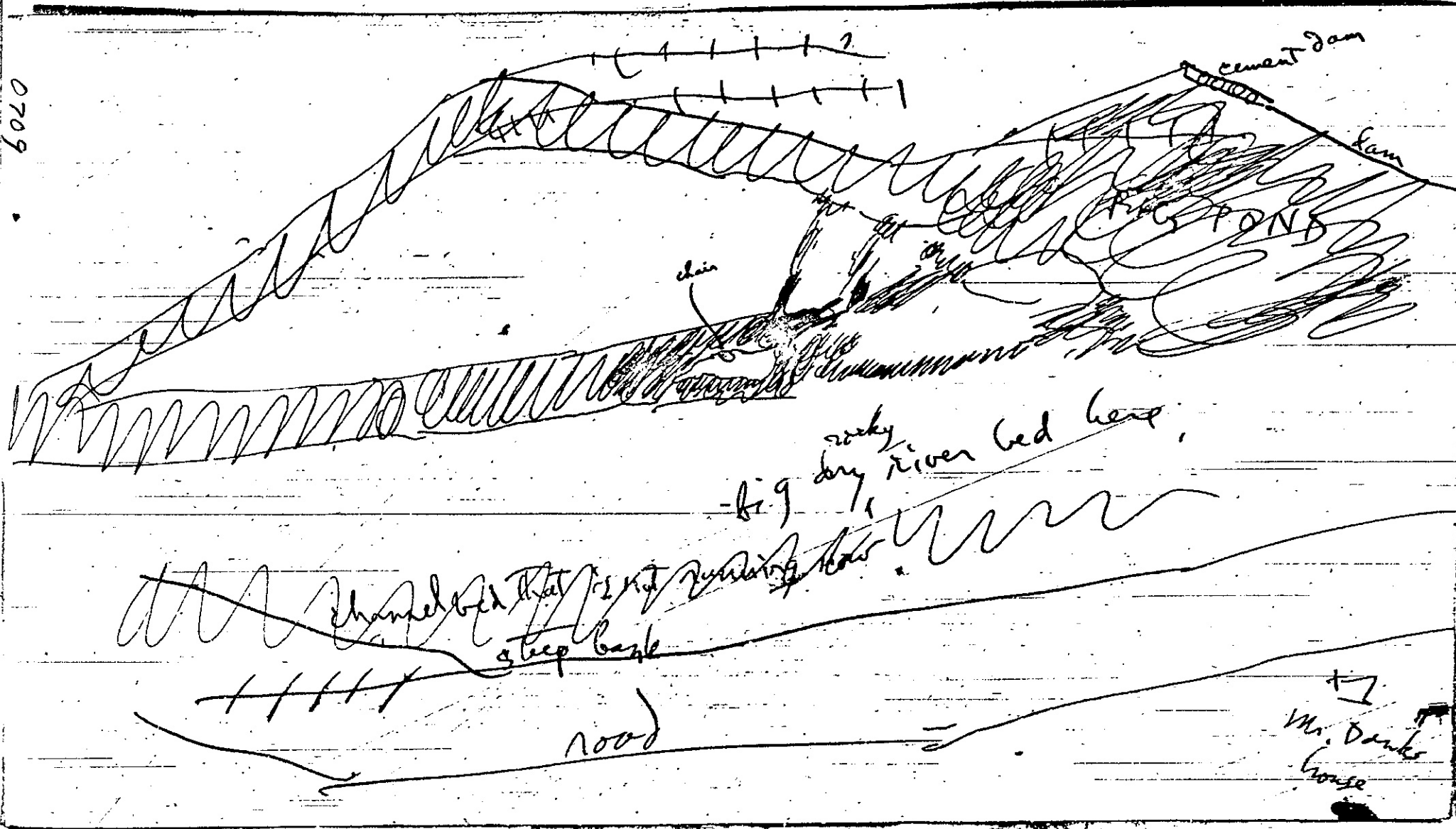

Just before we left midday
heading for Siletz, I asked Mully again
at great length about the identification
of paikaytkam. Says ~~that~~ & all
wd. & perfectly understood that paikaytkam
is a high mt., it is broken toward Yreka
(cross back of hand & illustrate) sort of
flat on top, timber on e. side just as in the
case of Salween, but western side timberless
Cagres western side is yellow-looking, says
we saw it from Ashland side: paikaytkam
& farthest south of a long chain of mts. that
she names go south beginning with Table.
Mt. She is positively that Tsiyaw is at
eastern slope of paikaytkam while Tsiyaw
is at eastern slope of Tatkawukh, and that
Tsiyaw & paikaytkam are close together, not
very far apart and agrees that if one went
uphill from Tsiyaw he wd come to paikaytkam.
When I ask where she was when she saw
Yreka, she says that she was somewhere
n. where she did not stay at widow woman's
house all the time but used to walk around
the mt., and Steven told her to come
up mt. with him, she climbed up, over
rocks, rocks like a table (= flat rocks)
& he showed her Yreka plain off
to the south. But she n. of this was

at Tsiyaw that she climbed up, @
or at Tiⁿth. (this is true, Yekuplain
is ^{certainly} probably visible from various places
on the ridges). ~~But~~ When I ask
her if we were near Tsiyaw when
we were at Buck Prairie yesterday,
she agrees, & agrees that it ~~may~~
have ascended pa'kaytkam mt.
So this morning I feel that pa'kaytkam
may be Table Mt. at any rate, she
has said many times that pa'kaytkam
is the last mt to the south in
her territory. She says that Tsiyaw
was a small flat, a camas field &
sprig coming from rocks, no cottonwoods
there, not a big plain such as
Buck Prairie is, & with sort of
open timber up slope ~~to~~ west of it.

When I ask her about Lake that
killed Steven says it is on w. slope
of ~~the~~ dead end ridge while Tiⁿth
is on e. slope, a sort of long narrowish
lake, not in a deep canyon, but in a sort
of flat a big lake, not a little lake ~~down~~

ask if it is on Murphy's ⁽⁵⁾
land, says Murphy had sheep
there at that lake. When I ask
if it is Onion Prairie, says
she never heard that name.

Mr. Murphy said that Onion Prairie
is just off Dead Indian Rd. a $\frac{1}{2}$ mile
or so, ~~on~~ on the w. slope of the Dead
hd. ridge, and that Murphys had ~~all~~ sheep
there. At one time it was owned by
Mrs. Murphy's sister.

When I ask if the "Kl. Lake rd"
was the rd. traveled by Kl. Lake
Inds. then they came to get flour,
was Dead Ind. rd., ~~that passed~~
through Ti: nth, says she does not know.
She seems to know nothing of the
present Kl. Falls rd. She says she
walked from Ti: nth to Tsiyaw one
forenoon & walked back again to Ti: nth
that same night, and also rd. this morning
that Tsiyaw is a sort of regional name,
through the it refers to one spot. She says the
old people taught her that there were

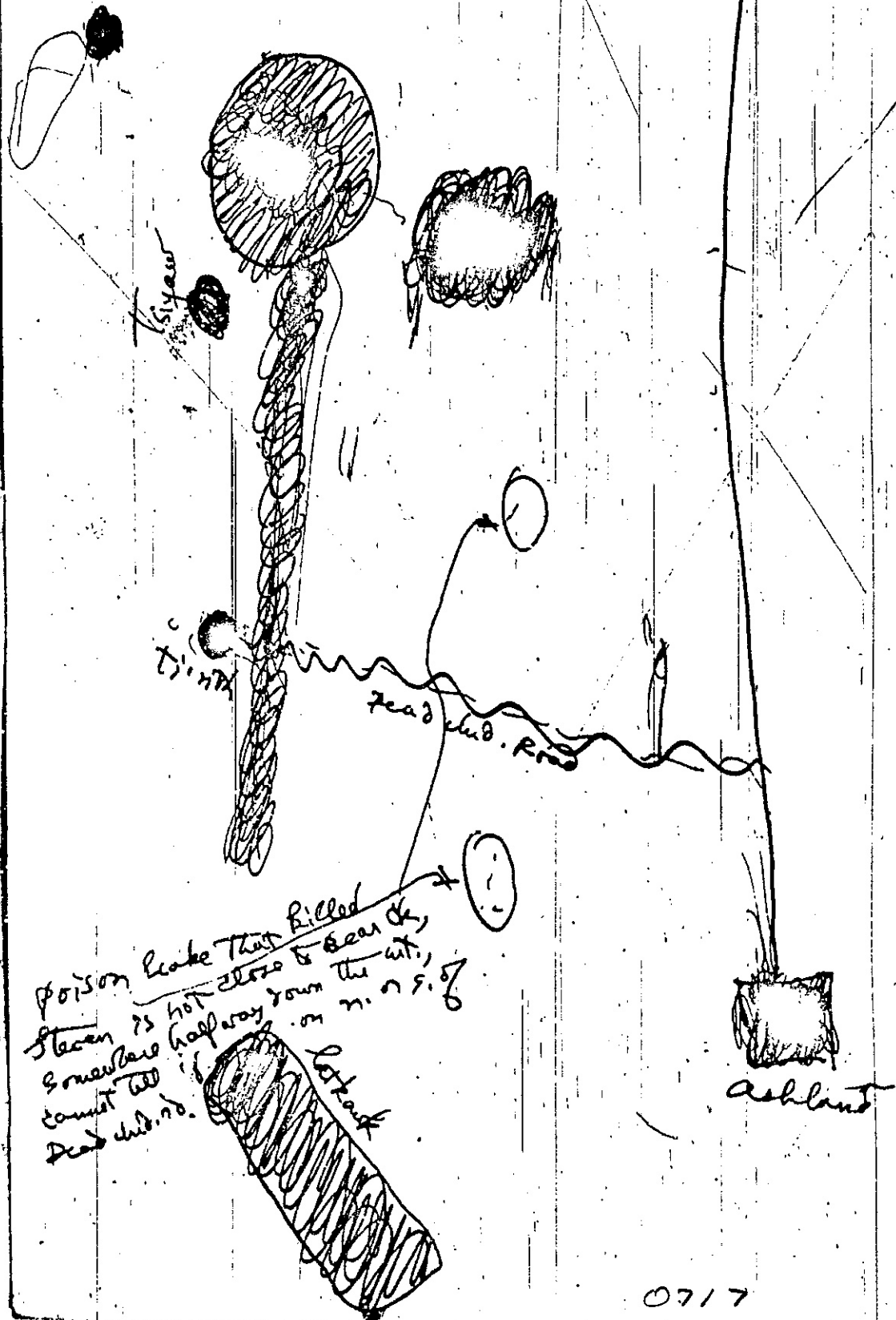

Molly has on 2 or 3 occasions
said that pa-kaytkam mt. is
humped. I understood at first that
she said it is humped or projecting toward
east direction, but today she holds

She was told that her ancestors on
one side (see the notes) came from
pa. kaytkam [so it must be a famous
or big mt. — this wd. suggest that it is
Table Mt.]. She knows that pa. kaytkam
is the mt. that has the bare western
slopes (→ Henry Mt.), when told that
to reach it from the north, she wd have
to go down — then up, she agrees.
She agrees that we sh. not see Yaska
from top of Henry Mt. When I try to
pin her again & again as to which side
of Dead End road — to north lake
is on, she shows she does not know,
all she knows is that it is midway
between latkawk and pa. kaytkam,
& half way down the slope (not
near Bear Cr. — not near the summit).
Mr. ~~the~~ Murphy says that to reach
Henry mt from Spencer's, one wd have
some 15 miles of walking, or pretty
rough country, & wd have to descend
& climb again, to get on slopes of
Henry mt., for they are detached,

The result of an hour's questioning
~~about~~ on whether Table Mt. or Henry
Mt. is pa'kaytkam, is that she was
taught the name pa'kaytkam from the
Ashland side, and therefore knows it to
be the grassy (steep) slopes of western side
of Henry Mt. (she says Henry Mt. had no
grass nor timber on west side, but timber,
oaks, etc. on its e. side. I explained
over ~~power~~ again about Table Mt. &
how I climbed it, flat stone top, & found
Henry Mt. to be separate, lower & to west
of Table Mt. She says that Table Mt.
must be on the same ridge as Catkaunk,
and therefore ed. call the whole thing
Catkaunk. But she knows Tsiyaw
Tsiyaw are on the e. side of the Paulsen
ridge (= Dead wood summit ridge). When I ask
if Tsiyaw is where we went today (to
Buck Prairie + Table Mt.), says she thinks it
is a little beyond, & yerk upward, of where
we went today. When I asked her on the
map where Tsiyaw was from pa'kaytkam,
placed Tsiyaw e. of Henry Mt., identifying
Henry Mt. as pa'kaytkam, because she was
taught & shown the pa'kaytkam Mt. from
the Ashland side

Molly says that ~~the~~ ^{to} ~~to~~ ^{inkh}
poison lake is ~~in~~ on the ashland-
ward slope of the divide (while
Tintah and Tsiyaw are on the
far side of the divide), and she
looked down & saw its dry bed
as she looked from top of ridge
towards Ashland. It was a good
sized lake. She cannot seem to
say that it is one side or the other
of Dead Indian road, but Mr.
Murphy will know. She mentions
Lathawk always in mentioning
location of this lake, ~~yet~~ ^{asked}
and says the lake was at foot of
mt. on Ashland side, yet when
I ask her if it was at the foot
of Lathawk mt., makes no clear
answers. The cold spring on rocky mt.
was somewhere near it - nec. if the lake or
the cold spg. was called Teto.inkh - or both.

Molly says that there was a
spring of blue water, good water, good
medicine water, somewhat on
Murphy's land in the Parken-
table Mt. region. There was a tin can
there to drink out of when Molly went
by the place. Very hard to understand
where it is. It is somewhere ~~at~~
of California near where Murphy's
house is in Ashland town.

There are 2 spgs. near
Murphy's old house (near Ashland
Creek). ① blue water spring
② ^{cold} medicine spring that Americans
used to drink as medicinal water.
But never drank the water of Jackson
spgs. — only bathed in Jackson spgs. water.
The blue water was close to
John Murphy's house. John Murphy's
house was across the creek (Bear ck. ~~at~~)
or for the calls it Ashland ck. The cold
medicine spg. was also in that same
vicinity.

Mr. Murphy says he thinks that
Kutty is right — that at one time
there was a house and barn on the
S. side of Lead Lickon Creek at
Paulsen's Upper meadow, that
was the Spencer place.
One of the early owners was Mr.
Enlow (phon ^{an} low), whose son
is still living in Ashland.

 wily Steven & had years before the
 when sheep herding gone to a lake
 that was somewhere betw. Lattakaw
 and Pa. Kaytham, and had seen
 it steaming. It was a big lake, a
 sort of poison lake, Nidly had told him
 how all the country was sort of
 poison here in old times. When he visited
 it again later on, ^{it} he was surprised to
 see it dry. ^{He walked on its hard white ~~with the floor~~ floor,} it was dry, and he took
 a stone and threw it in a sort of
 spring that the lake had had in it, and
 all of a sudden the water spouted
 up, making a bubbling sound,
~~and the~~ the evening of that day
 (that he threw rock in lake) he came home
 had no appetite for supper, & said he
^{Moyle told him it was bad to throw at that water.}
 that he was g. to die, and next morning
 he gave up his job and had his ~~goods~~
 household goods hauled to Phoenix. At
 Phoenix they ~~are~~ couple worked for Sam,
 Phoenix storekeeper, & in 4 months Steven
 died. This lake was at foot or on slope of mts. on

Ashland ward (west) side of the Paulsen divide.

 says is name of a poison lake that killed
 Steven, and a few minutes later says
 it is name of a very cold spring
 that comes out in a mt. top somewhere

 lake & spring on this side of the

 latkawh and pa-kaytkam. Vs.
 clearly ^{again & again} that there are 2 places
 on the east side of the divide: t[#]nth
 and tsiyaw, tsiyaw being
 on the far (eastern) side of pa-kaytkam,
 and 3 names on the latter side
 of the divide (west side): kathkawh,
 tæto[#]nth and pa-kaytkam.

~~the~~ tæto[#]nth is betw. latkawh
 & pa-kaytkam but n. where, possibly where
 she saw some white rocks (on ^{Wlameth} ~~the~~ road?)
 [most, used to call kulaya Rocky Mt.]
 where the ice-cold spg. is, is on a
 rocky hill. No etym. for tæto[#]nth.

Sun. Nov. 19th 1933

We drove to Ashland, & went to see Mr. Edward J. Murphy, cor. of 8th & B sts, son of John Murphy. Edward has an older brother. Living in Ashland named John J. Murphy. A sister, whom Molly knew, was named Lizzie. She kept a rooming house in San Francisco & died there in the earthquake in 1906. Mrs. Murphy remembered having ^{seen and} Molly when he was a boy. Molly left ~~for~~ Steve when Steve was herding sheep for Mr. Murphy, and she went to live in Ashland, but later she went back to live with Steve again. They made up and the Murphy boys were greatly amused. Mrs. Murphy's father ~~so~~ employed Steven maybe 15 or 20 different times. Steven ~~was~~ quit & then start again. He was a good sheep herder.

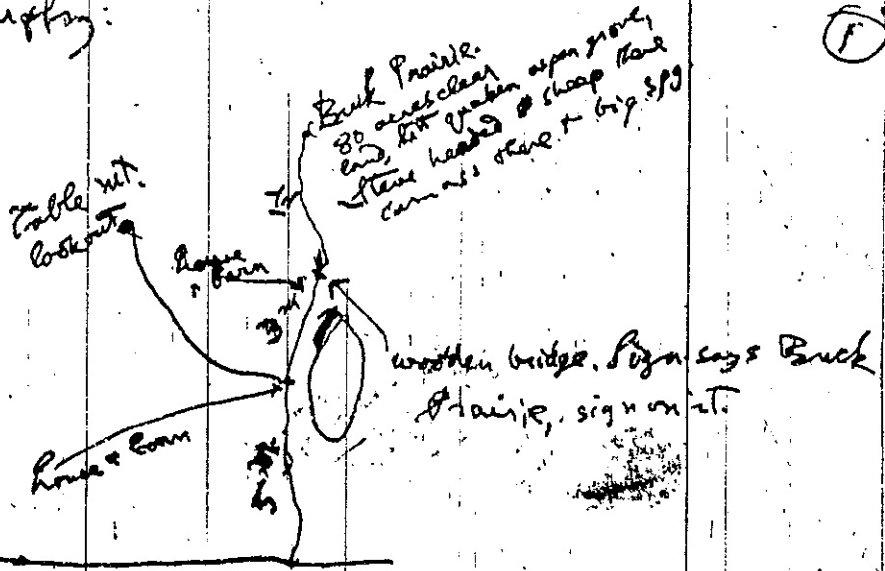

Mr. Murphy said when I told him
Missy's info. about the plans. T. n. th,
Tsiyaw and pa-kaytkam, that it sounded
as if she might mean Table Mt., for Table
Mt. is the s. end of the ridge that
runs from Paulsen's summit, and
from it one looks over the ranges
that ~~run~~ ~~between~~ ~~Calif.~~ ~~and~~ ~~Ore.~~ run near
the ~~border~~ Calif.-Oregon border, &
for beyond. But one cannot look
down enough from Table Mt. to see
Yeka town, one can only see where
the town is. When told of her
description of Tsiyaw, he thought it
might be Cottonwood Glade, which is
at the e. foot of Table Mt., or Buck
Prairie, which lies ev. north of
Cottonwood Glade about ~~1~~ $\frac{1}{4}$ miles.
From the top of Table Mt. one can
see Buck Prairie, but cannot see
Cottonwood Glade because of the thick
timber between.

Mr. Murphy says ^{his father} had sheep-
ranches only at 4 places: ① Buck
Prairie, ② Cottonwood glade,
③ Onica Prairie (on Richland-ward
slope of Paulsen's summit), and
at Henry's place. Never had
any sheep at Paulsen's (= the
Spencer) place. Never had sheep
on top of Table Mt. unless they
just happened to pass thru there.

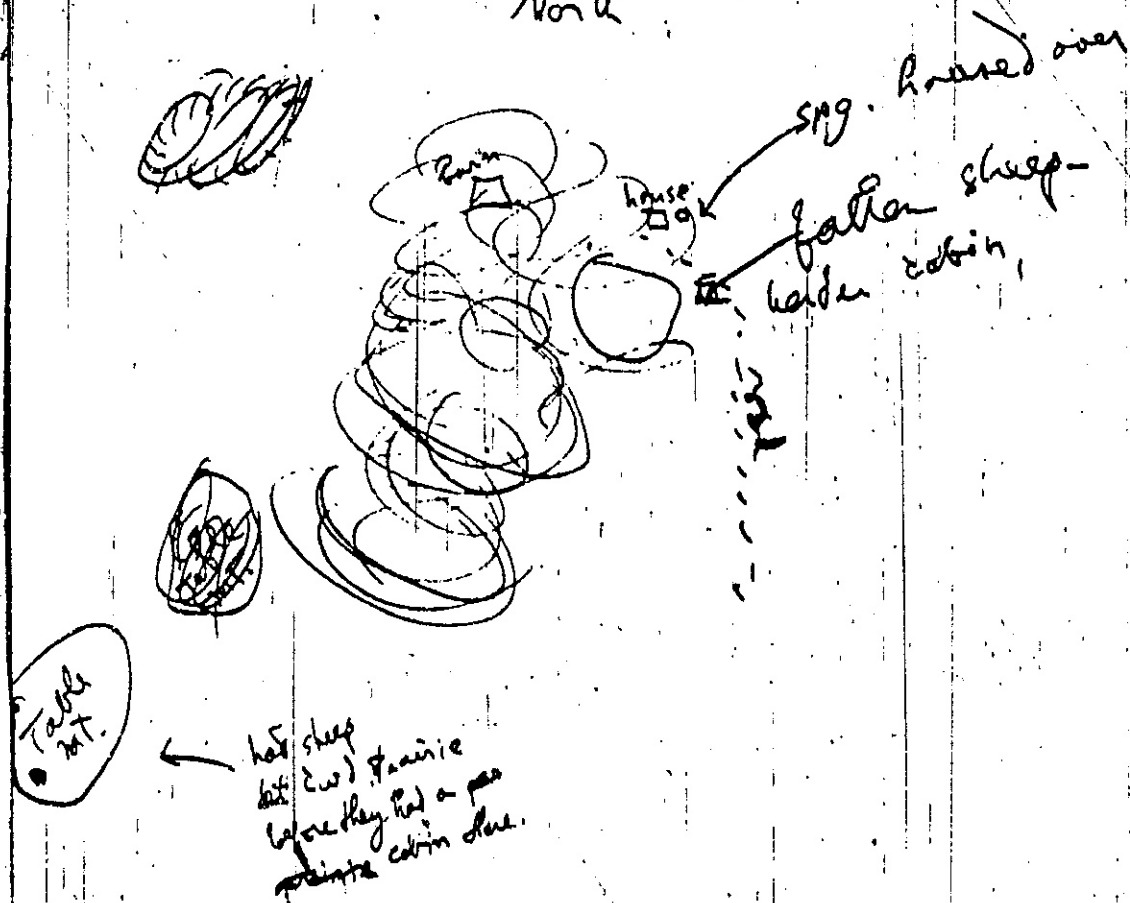

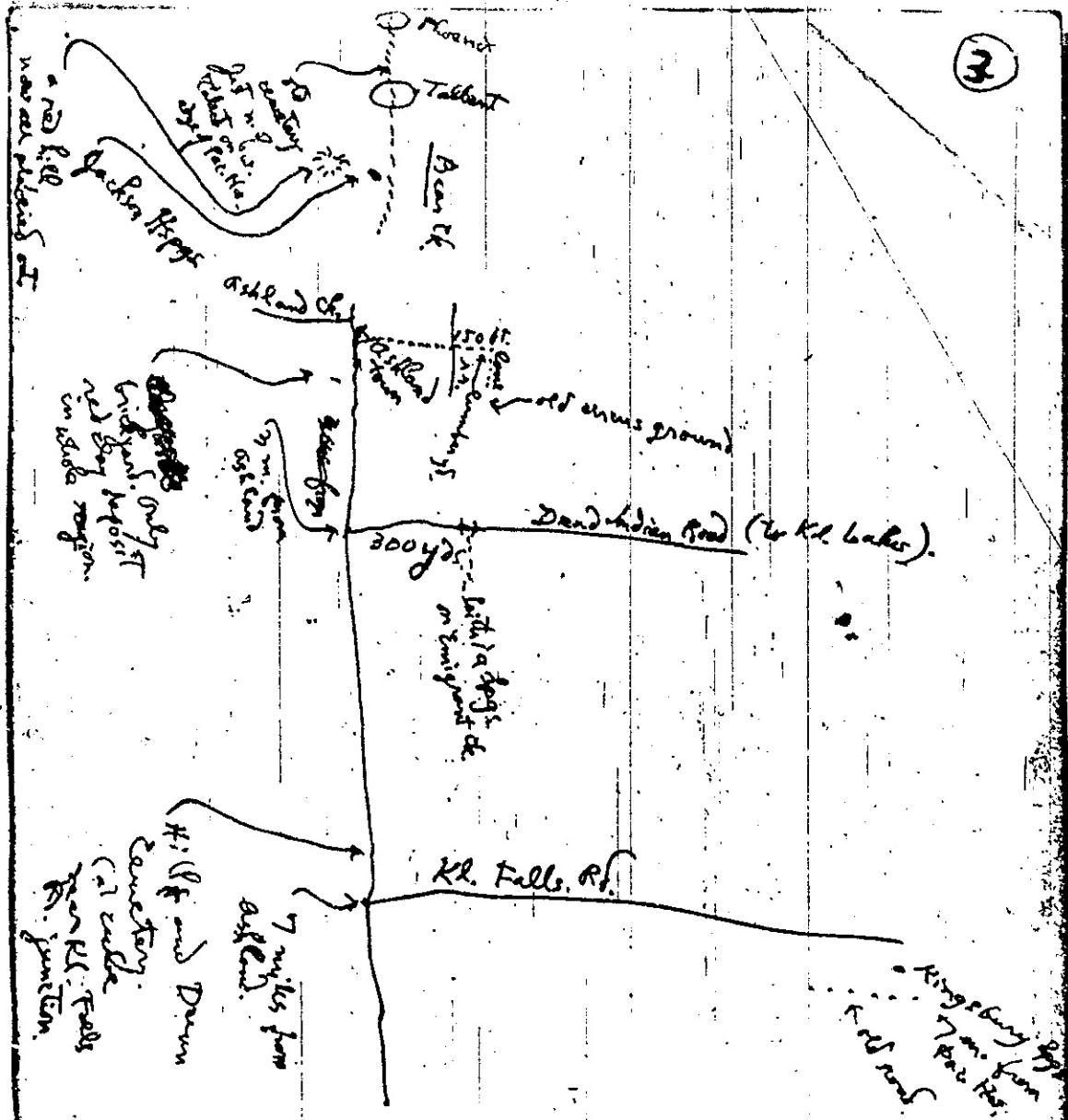
Thursday's Trip, to Ashland & Rocky Ann Mt. ①

We started from auto cabin on Pac. H.W. north of Center Point & drove to Medford, where we did shopping, and thence to Ashland. At Ashland I asked several merchants about places. Ashland is on Ashland Creek, a western tributary of Bear Creek, & Bear Ck. is a southern tributary of Rogue River.

The drugstore on the business street that runs along S. bank of Ashland Creek gave the best info. He said that the poison lake, described by Mully as n. of Ashland, might be Jackson Sp. Hot Springs, & that the old cemetery that Mully told about is on the W. edge of the Pacific Highway just north of Tallent. The merchants mentioned two red ~~algaes~~ ^{algaes}, one west of Bear Ck. north of Ashland, and the other a brickyard site, south west of Ashland, near Ashland Junior College. Troy Tanakh the drugstore clerk guessed to be a place across

Bear Creek from Ashland. He told me to go to Oak Street & drive east across the railroad tracks and on across Bear Cr., and immediately after crossing Bear Cr. to take the road to the left. It leads direct to a curious sandstone formation (evidently on the lower western slope of what proved to be Cathawk Mountain), just across Bear Cr. from Ashland. One of these rocks is called the horseshoe, another is called the rabbit, the drug clerk played at them when a boy some 40 years ago. When Molly was taken to the stock yard and asked about these rocks, she said she had never heard of them or seen them.



The drugstore clerk says there are two highways that lead east. The Klamath Lakes hwy. leads east from 3 miles S. of Ashland, and goes up over Dead Indian Mt. Lithia spgs. are on Emigrant Ch. (see map above). The Kl. Falls hwy. leaves from hwy. 7 miles S. of Ashland - Kingsbury Springs are on it (see map)

Drugstore clerk at Ashland street that owns along Ashland Ch. gave info. and map on this sheet.
